# **Chairman's Report**

s we enter the final year of our current term, it is perhaps an opportunity to reflect on what we have achieved so far and what we can continue to achieve in our fourth year as well as putting things in place for the future.

We started the term with celebrations for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the Olympics/Paralympics. The Fayre for the Jubilee in Queens Road was our first joint event with the BH Residents' Society, a relationship that we have built on for the Christmas Events in Queens Road which are also supported by the BH Town Centre Partnership. The Chairman's Tea for the Olympics/Paralympics was held in our Roding Valley Hall which had a makeover for the occasion, giving a kick start for our Halls' maintenance programme. We also ran a joint event for the Tour de France last year and a legacy from that is the planters along Queens Road which with assistance from the Residents' Society, Town Centre Partnership and traders we are making a permanent enhancement. To further support local businesses we have allocated some car parking bays at the Roding Valley Hall for shoppers.

We have worked closely with the BH Leisure Gardens Association who run the Allotment sites on our behalf and have funded maintenance of gates and fences. We continue to maintain our Open Spaces which includes paying for grass cutting and we have commissioned a Tree Survey to identify trees on Parish Council land which need attention, some of this work has already been carried out.

The Council takes part in the Salt Bag Scheme and the 'free' salt is for use on public roads and pavements. We have also arranged that in severe weather additional gritting is carried out on priority roads not gritted by Essex County Council.

In August 2013 we relocated the Parish Offices to Buckhurst Hill Library. The sale of the old offices has enabled us to clear the loan on the old office/Information Centre and given a capital receipt of approximately £100,000 for use towards future major projects in the parish.

A new venture has been the Community Cinema which takes place twice a year in the Roding Valley Hall and is free to Buckhurst Hill residents. Another first is the installation of an Outdoor Gym on the site of the disused Hornbeam Road playground; we continue to

maintain the Playground at Kings Place, and the Playground and Ball Court on the Recreation Ground

On your behalf we have responded to the District Council's Local Plan which sets future planning policy and we await the next consultation. We will also be putting together a Neighbourhood Plan which will become part of local planning policy and we'll need your help.

As the Council's Chairman I am often privileged to attend events on behalf on the Parish such as the lighting of the Menorah at the top of Queens Road and attending the wreath laying and Remembrance events around the Parish. At this year's wreath laying ceremony at St Johns, a new memorial plaque was dedicated that had been jointly funded by this Council and the BH Royal British Legion.

My Chairman's Charity has been the Alzheimer's Society and so far we have raised over £2000 from people's donations at events. This interest led to the Older People's Forum from which a new U3A group has started in Buckhurst Hill. A number of Dementia Action Alliance sessions have been held and we plan to offer further sessions for 'Dementia Champions' later this year.

The Council has moved positively forward these last 3 years however, a personal frustration of mine whilst I have been Chairman has been the limit of the remit of the Parish Council. Cllr Hale Wheeler wrote an article in the previous edition of the magazine detailing the services within our control. I would like to see the Parish Council having a greater presence within the Community, contracting a much larger array of services and being the 'go to' organisation to make things happen. However whilst the vision is great in reality we function only on monies collected from the precept (local council tax), revenue generated from our two community halls and grants that we are eligible to apply for.

So we as a Council have focused on becoming more efficient while at the same time freezing the precept and increasing the reserves to allow the council to consider future projects. Our remit has already increased with the Cinema and Older People's Forum – small things can make a difference. We are also looking at contracting our own Police Community Support Officer for Buckhurst Hill and I hope to update you on the progress of this soon.

I am very proud that the 2 Christmas events have bought the community together working with volunteers and businesses. The budgets for these events were small and it must not be forgotten that it was volunteers gave their time freely that made these events happen. The Buckhurst Hill Residents' Society and the Town Centre Partnership are two examples of local voluntary organisations and I ask, if you want to support future events and serve your community; why not join these organisations and others in the locality to make more things happen? There is a real sense of community within Buckhurst Hill and we must not forget the part we each play in it.

I am keen to hear your thoughts about the Parish in general and in particular what you would like to see the Parish focus on in our final year of office. Please email me, patelaniket17@yahoo.co.uk with your thoughts

# Budget 2015-2016

ouncillors have set the budget for the next financial year with an anticipated expenditure of £471128 and anticipated income of £79466. This covers maintenance of halls, playgrounds, ball court, allotments, open spaces; magazine, cinema, events and staffing, and allows for the funding of a PCSO for the area, a Neighbourhood Plan and a Youth Project in conjunction with local organisations. By using its reserves the Council has ensured that there is no increase for an average Band D household which will pay 68.89 to the parish council for the third year running.

### **GET FIT CLOSER TO HOME**

will receive a County Council grant of £6,500 towards its planned construction in the Spring, it seems that people are realising the benefits of finding ways to keep fit closer to home.

It has been found that outdoor gyms installed in neighbouring London boroughs and other parts of Essex are used by a greater variety of age groups and also people who would not necessarily have the means or inclination to go to a more conventional gym.



# **A Planning View**

t probably sounds a little odd saying it now, but Happy New Year to all our readers. This is, after all, the first Parish publication for 2015. Let's start by saying we must all make this year one to really remember. One that we can all look back on positively when we review it next year. Whatever you had been procrastinating

over, make a concerted effort to get up and get that thing started. Great journeys start with one small step.

As a local Councillor, one of my seats is with the Parish Council Planning & Environment Committee. I thought it be useful to demystify what factors are taken into account when considering a planning application (and equally what are not).

First and foremost, it's worth saying that the Parish is not the final decision maker for planning applications. Irrespective of the way we vote on an application, we are the first (but important) rung, so to speak, on the ladder (excuse the construction-related pun). As a broad stroke here's what we, at the Parish, have to consider:

- General design, visual appearance, and materials
- Layout and density of buildings
- Loss of daylight or sunlight
- Overshadowing/loss of outlook (but not loss of view)
- Overlooking/loss of privacy
- Noise and disturbance from planned use
- Smell pollution
- Light pollution
- Highway safety issues
- Traffic generation
- Vehicular access
- Adequacy of parking
- Loss of important trees
- Nature conservation
- Intrusion into the Open Countryside/ Green Belt
- Hazardous materials and ground contamination
- Disabled persons access
- Whilst moral objections e.g. to uses such as amusement arcades and betting offices are not usually part of our remit, we will consider local resident and occupier's views in this respect
- Previous planning decisions which the Parish has been involved with
- Building Regulations or other non-planning laws, e.g. structural stability, drainage, fire precautions etc are not usually considered by the Parish, but we may highlight

aspects which are cause for concern which are then looked at in more detail further down the line.

Additional factors which are considered further up on the rungs of the ladder include:

- Local, strategic, regional and national planning policies
- Government circulars, orders and statutory instruments
- Previous planning decisions (including appeal decisions)
- Risk of flooding
- Effect of Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas
- Archaeology
- Landscaping

There are, however many misconceptions of what is **not** of material consideration and these include:

- Effect to property values
- Breach of restrictive covenant
- Loss of trade to a competitor
- The level of profit a developer might make
- Personal circumstances of the applicant (in most cases).
   A, not uncommon, comment might be that an extension/outhouse is being proposed for the benefit of an aging family member. Planning considerations are based on the long term use of a proposal (and not just how it will be used in the short term)
- Private issues between neighbours e.g. land/boundary disputes, damage to property, private rights of way, covenants etc. These are private matters between the two parties.
- Problems arising from the construction period of any works, e.g. noise, dust, construction vehicles, hours of work etc.
   That said, we can suggest restrictions be placed on working hours and vehicular routes for heavy goods vehicles so as to cause as little impact on the community as possible.

None of the above is a concise and exhaustive list, but serves only as an outline. One thing that can be said, is that the Parish is here to support and defend its highly valued residents and occupants; all those that live, work and enjoy our wonderful surroundings. The committee members, like you, live locally and in many respects are just like you.

It would be easy, but unfair, to fill this magazine with articles appropriate to the topic of planning. And with that in mind, I'll sign off for now. In the next edition of the Parish magazine, we'll go further into how local Councillors can help, what happens at meetings and how you can get involved. Till then, bye for now.

### **COUNTY UPDATE**

ighways matters are one of the areas that I receive most comments about and I guess this will always be the case. However, I am pleased to report that some progress has been made in some areas. It is really good to see that after such a long campaign, we have eventually got the speed table implemented at the crossroads of Forest Edge, Farm Way and Station Way. This came at a cost of about £73,000 but let's hope it does improve safety.

We continue to look at the difficulty for pedestrians at the crossroads at Palmerston Road, Loughton Way, Roding Lane and Albert Road. This is a very difficult area with a great volume of traffic.

I believe there is some refurbishment in the pipeline and we are hoping to use that to ensure greater provision for pedestrians, and hopefully improve the situation for cars turning right, particularly out of Albert Road where there is often an unacceptable queue of traffic at busy times of the day.

We have been trying to get some double yellow lines painted in some areas for junction protection or to prevent unsuitable parking which should then improve visibility for car drivers. We are also trying to remove some lines which go too far up side roads and restrict parking for residents. I am hoping that this work will take place in late spring.

On another matter, I am delighted to report that from September we are now getting back sixth forms into our local schools including Roding Valley High School and Debden Park High School. This has taken a long time to achieve but I think it will make a difference both to standards in the schools and to help students with stability and continuity after they have taken their GCSEs. So from September this year, whilst students can still choose to go elsewhere, parents will not have the stress of worrying about whether there is a place somewhere else for their 16 year old children. I am really pleased that after 5 years of campaigning for this, it is at last going to happen

# MISSING BUS SHELTER

s many residents will be aware the bus shelter outside the Bald Faced Stag went missing some months ago when contractors were carrying out works nearby. Council Officers have carried out investigations and have had a protracted correspondence with Essex County Council's Highways to establish who took the bus shelter and arrange for its replacement but all to no avail. A replacement bus shelter would cost this Council approximately £7000.

As this has been going for so long without resolution and we are sorry to say had such an effect on residents, particularly senior residents, councillors have written a letter to the ECC Cabinet Member for Highways Maintenance and we are awaiting a response as we go to press.

### HAVING YOUR SAY ON WHAT YOUR COMMUNITY SHOULD LOOK LIKE:

Il too often people will find themselves worrying about the changing face of their community and wondering how those changes have come about.

With more and more people staying put because of the cost of moving, extensions to homes are common place and most of us will have experienced building work of this kind close to where we live or have carried out this kind of work ourselves. New homes are being built to accommodate the growing population in Buckhurst Hill, as in other parts of the country.

Whilst it is difficult to see how this kind of development can be avoided, it is equally important that people realise they can have a say in the development going on in their neighbourhood through various means, particularly if they are concerned about the impact of any proposal on their own home, street or local area more generally.

The weekly lists of planning applications made in Buckhurst Hill are available on the Parish Council's website and on the notice boards around the Parish; and because the applications are

made to Epping Forest District Council, fuller details (including plans) can be found on their website at <a href="http://www.eppingforestdc.gov.uk">http://www.eppingforestdc.gov.uk</a>.

If residents wish to comment on a particular application they can send their comments into the Parish Council or indeed attend the Planning Committee meeting of the Parish Council at which the application will be considered. The dates of the meetings are available on the website and posted on the noticeboards.

Residents should note that the Parish Council does not make the final decision about planning applications but can pass residents' comments and objections on to Epping Forest District Council, which will make the final decision. Subject to notifying the District Council, residents are also free also to attend any meeting about the application at their offices. Residents can also make a request for their Parish Councillors to speak on their behalf at any relevant planning meeting held by the District Council, at which the application will be considered.

The District Council will deal with comments that are relevant to planning

law but the right of residents to comment on planning applications is an important one and gives them a real opportunity to have their say on changes to the appearance of their local area.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

In further pursuit of having influence over the changing face of Buckhurst Hill, the Parish Council has taken its first steps towards preparing a Neighbourhood Plan. Its application has been submitted to Epping Forest District Council and can be viewed on their website:

www.eppingforestdc.gov.uk/neighbourhoodplanning

Having a Neighbourhood plan should enable people in Buckhurst Hill to help shape how their community will look in the future by reference to issues such as where new homes can be built, what new buildings should look like and what green spaces must be protected.

Residents should look out for further information on the Neighbourhood plan, as everyone affected will have the opportunity to have their say.
